Egyptologists assemble!

We met Blackburn's very own mummy and got to see and handle lots of artefacts from the Egyptian period. Did you know that Blackburn museum's Egyptology artefacts were donated by a Blackburn resident from the late 1800s who was a mathematician and archaeologist? We used the

different sources to explore and examine who the mummified person may have been. The children asked some amazing questions and were very knowledgeable. The museum staff were very impressed with their level of knowledge and facts.

We saw the Egyptian Gallery with its very own mummy, we looked closely at Egyptian artefacts (some that were 3000 years old!) and we learnt how to write our names in hieroglyphs.


